Voter Eligibility

To be eligible to vote, you must be:

- United States citizen
- Age 18 or older by Election Day
- Resident of the Village of Jackson for at least 28 consecutive days before the election
- Finished serving sentence, including probation/parole, if convicted of felony

Voter Registration

Register Online if you have a current and valid Wisconsin Driver License or ID Card.

You may register in the Village Clerk's Office with acceptable proof of residency through the Friday before an election.

On Election Day you can register to vote at your polling place with acceptable proof of residency.

Proof of Residency

When registering, you need to present one of the following documents—either in paper or electronic format—showing your current name at your address:

- WI driver license or WI state ID card
- Utility bill from last 90 days (water, gas, electric, cable, internet, landline, or cellular phone)
- Checking or Savings Bank Statement
- Property tax bill or receipt
- Government document or check
- Paycheck/Electronic Deposit Slip
- Residential Lease (a lease cannot be used when registering by mail)
- Affidavit on letterhead from a public or private social service agency that is providing services to a homeless voter
- College fee statement from last 9 months, with student ID

Voting Absentee

Absentee ballots are kept sealed and secured and locked in the Clerk's Office until counted at the polls on Election Day.

You may vote absentee in the Clerk's Office between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. weekdays, beginning the 14th day before an election and ending at 5:00 p.m. the Friday before an election. Some extended hours may apply. Notices will be posted at Village Hall and on the Village web-site.

Voting Absentee by Mail

To receive an absentee ballot by mail, submit an absentee application containing with the following:

- Your name
- Address where registered to vote
- Address where ballot should be sent
- Your signature

Send the Clerk's Office a copy or picture of your ID along with your absentee request.

It is a felony to vote at the polls if you have returned an absentee ballot to the Clerk's Office.

In order for your absentee ballot to be counted, you must:

- ✓ **Sign the certificate** envelope.
- ✓ Have a **witness sign and write their complete address** on the envelope.

Election Day

Polls open at **7:00 a.m.** and close at **8:00 p.m.** Everyone in line at 8:00 p.m. gets to vote.

If you move within 28 days of an election you can only vote from your previous address, at your old polling place.

Voters with mobility issues or difficulty waiting in line may vote from the curb of their polling place.

Voters must sign or make their mark on the poll book. Voters unable to sign due to a disability are exempt from this requirement

Voter Photo ID

Wisconsin requires voters to show Photo ID. The following types of Photo ID's are acceptable:

- Wisconsin driver license or Wisconsin DOT-issued photo ID card expiring 11/06/18 or later
- U.S. Passport expiring 11/06/18 or later
- Military ID card expiring 11/06/18 or later
- Certificate of naturalization issued within last 2 years
- Unexpired Wisconsin driver license or DOT-issued photo ID receipt
- Unexpired ID card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in Wisconsin
- Wisconsin accredited university/college ID with issuance date, signature, and expiration within 2 years of issuance, and proof of current enrollment.

An acceptable photo ID is not required to include a current address.

Remember, you **MUST** say it, show it, and sign it to receive your ballot.
